

- 1563 Builds Komaki Castle.
- 1567 Attacks Mino. Issues the Tenka Fubu seal.
- 1575 Battle of Nagashino. Defeats Takeda's forces.
- 1576 Azuchi Castle is built.
- 1579 Promulgates the rakuichi rakuza policy in the Azuchi
- 1582 Ambushed by his retainer Akechi Mitsuhide at Kyoto's

Incense-tossing **Fool of Owari**

When Nobunaga was young he would dress in eccentric clothes and constantly act up, causing people to call him an utsuke, which meant "great fool." At his father's funeral, he acted very strangely, arriving late in his regular clothes and throwing incense at the mortuary tablet.



Come Merchants! Create Wealth! History's Greatest Economist

Nobunaga cared about finances. He promulgated the rakuichi rakuza policies in his own castle town to stimulate trade with free-market economics and antitrust measures. As well, he abolished checkpoints and improved roads, helping to stimulate the flow of goods. This provided him with enormous profits that enabled Nobunaga to build a powerful army of retainers.





Kind to those he liked, harsh to those he didn't. He loved to play favorites!

Nobunaga is known as an merciless figure who reveled in massacre and mayhem, but he was kind to the people he liked. He had a caring side, too. It is said that he enjoyed attending festivals with the public, distributed food to the poor to save them from starvation, and wrote considerate letters to the wives of his subordinates.



To Rule a Nation! Castle Route



With his victory at Okehazama, Nobunaga established a foothold in Komaki and Inuyama and extended his power into Mino (the southern area of present-day Gifu). You will visit many places steeped in Japanese culture, including many castles, and castle towns, from which Nobunaga launched his campaign of conquest. Visiting Nagoya Castle, from Route 1, and Kiyosu Castle, from Route 2, it is possible to follow a special castle-only tour.

In 1563, Nobunaga moved his base from Kiyosu to Mt. Komaki, where he then built a castle, as a launching point for his invasion of Mino. The current Komaki Castle was erected in 1967 as the Komaki History Museum. Perched on the top of the small, lush hill, it is famed as a cherry blossom site.

Nagashino Castle belonged to the Tokugawa clan when it was surrounded by a Takeda army thirty times the size of the garrison. Nobunaga and his ally Tokugawa hurried there with a large army to lift the siege. The castle was saved when Nobunaga won the Battle of Shitaragahara. Visitors can learn about the Battle of Nagashino at the adjacent Preservation Hall.



On the Trail of the Oda Family Route





This route begins in Ichinomiya, one of the fiefs controlled by the Oda family. Like the Odas, let us use our time and money wisely, and set off on the trail of Nobunaga.



Masumida Jinja Shrine



This shrine of noble origin was once the first and principle shrine of the Owari region. It boasts a history of over 2,600 years, and the city of Ichinomiya ("first shrine") was named after it. Retainer Seki Narimasa received a gift of Japanese incense from Nobunaga, and in turn dedicated it to the shrine.






The shopping precinct stands directly in front of Masumida Jinja Shrine. The 500-meters long arcade houses 120 shops.
